



Greetings from the President & Executive Director



Resilience. A word that has always been part of the vernacular at Mothercraft but one that has taken on new meaning as we continued to navigate through the twists and turns of the global pandemic through 2021.

As many will know, Mothercraft's mission is to support healthy child development and strengthen families. We do that in a variety of ways, all of which are about fostering a sense of resilience. For children, for families, and for the professionals who serve them. For the last two years, our focus on resilience has sharpened as we ask ourselves, how can we best support our communities and our staff to ensure the best outcomes despite the unprecedented stressors confronting us all?

The answer has been to continue to adapt to whatever COVID-19 puts in front of us thoughtfully, responsively and with an emphasis on the health and well-being of everyone. And some extraordinary things happened. We received

funding to leverage Mothercraft's extensive expertise in infant and early childhood mental health, and as a post-secondary institution, to develop a new national training curriculum for Early Childhood Educators. *Building Resilience through Trauma-Informed Practices in Early Childhood Settings* is a certificate-level training for practicing ECEs aimed at building upon existing knowledge to address issues children may be experiencing related to stress and trauma. Working in partnership with experts and advisors from across Canada, this innovative and much-needed curriculum will be piloted and rolled out across the country in 2022.

Next, despite multiple waves of COVID across the city and outbreaks in many of our programs, Mothercraft staff provided more hours of service than ever before, both in person and virtually. This is due, in large part, to the extraordinary efforts of our staff to reach out to families, modify program delivery methods and find ways to continue to serve and support. It's also due to the fact that, in spite of the pandemic, we were able to open not one, but two, new child care centres in 2021. The

Midtown Centre for Early Development opened its doors in the Yonge/Eglinton community in April, thanks to a partnership between the City of Toronto, Shiplake Properties and Mothercraft. And in November, the Avondale Centre for Early Development welcomed children and families into the Avondale Elementary Alternative School, thanks to a partnership with the City and the Toronto District School Board. These two new centres complement the three centres Mothercraft has operated for decades - Robertson House, Eaton Centre and Brookfield Place - and are the first new child care programs the agency has opened in 30 years. Very exciting and a tremendous feat given how complex it is to open a child care centre under normal circumstances, never mind in the midst of a global crisis.

Our amazing college team once again delivered the academic component of the ECE Diploma program entirely online in 2021. The resilience of the students and faculty to adapt to the ups and downs of the year speaks to their commitment, focus and drive and we couldn't be prouder. Lastly, Mothercraft's early intervention team concluded its multi-year project, *Building Connections:*Supporting Community-Based Programs to Address Interpersonal Violence and Child Maltreatment. Results of this five-year initiative – to train colleagues in 35 communities across Canada on Mothercraft's family violence intervention and evaluate its impact – will be published in 2022.

And if all that wasn't enough, the work of planning for implementation of Mothercraft's ambitious strategic plan began in earnest in 2021. At the end of the 10-year plan – entitled *Vision 2031* - Mothercraft will serve more families and train more professionals across a much broader geography with an emphasis on under-served and equity-deserving communities. We will leverage our 90-year history to strengthen systems, share our knowledge and enhance our ability to deliver high quality services. Some of the early priorities include the creation of a Truth & Reconciliation Action Plan along with a Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Action Plan to address historic legacies and ensure Mothercraft is able to attract, recruit

and retain the best staff and appropriately meet the needs of communities. We already have strong policies and practices in place regarding these important issues but there is always more to learn and do. And given some of the terrible events of 2021 – the discovery of thousands of children's graves at former residential school sites, the hateful targeting of newcomer and immigrant families and the inspiration of the Black Lives Matter movement – we are compelled to do more, as individuals and as an organization.

It is our sincere hope that 2022 brings about the end of all things COVID-19. But even if it doesn't, we know that the amazing people of Mothercraft – the Board of Directors, the staff, our funders and our community partners – will work together to figure it out. It's what we've done for the last two years. In fact, it's what we've done for the last 90 years. And it's what we'll do for all the years to come. Because we are nothing if not resilient.
