



Greetings from the President & Executive Director



"Hang on to your hat. Hang on to your hope. And wind the clock, for tomorrow is another day." E.B. White

Like these wise words from the author of the beloved children's novel, *Charlotte's Web*, throughout the pandemic everyone at Mothercraft held onto the belief – as they always do – that fresh starts happen every day, things can always get better and that we must never abandon hope. In fact, 2022 reminded us there are many, many reasons to look forward to tomorrow.

Canada started the year in the midst of its fifth wave of COVID-19 outbreaks and with some of the highest infection rates since the start of the global health emergency in March of 2020. The country ended the year with life returning to (almost) normal and many restrictions lifted. All of which was cause for celebration – no more PPE, no more lockdowns, no more intense cleaning regimes and the full resumption of all in-person services across Mothercraft!

But perhaps the most significant thing that happened in 2022 – at least for those of us whose focus is on children and their families - was the signing of the agreement between Canada and Ontario, after all other provinces and territories had already signed, to fully and finally make the Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care program (CWELCC) a reality. This historic, new program, and the significant investments attached to it, was a direct response to the realities of COVID. That's because when child care centres closed along with almost everything else in those early days of the pandemic, it became abundantly clear just how much our economy and labour markets rely on child care to keep everyone - and everything – working. And it didn't take long to fully grasp how a lack of social interactions with peers and early learning professionals was going to impact the social-emotional, cognitive and even physical health of children.

The creation of a national system of early learning and child care has been a long-standing yet

elusive goal. Decades and decades of research and advocacy and, in fact, two prior attempts by the federal government to create this kind of system, have never quite materialized. But timing is everything and tomorrow really is another day. The early learning sector is still recovering from the impacts of COVID yet there is great cause for excitement and celebration. The \$30 billion federal investment over five years will mean the creation of more than 250,000 new child care spaces across Canada (86,000 in Ontario) and the transition from parent fees that previously cost over \$2000/month for infant care to an average of \$10/day for all children enrolled in a CWELCC centre (by 2025).

Mothercraft has always been a voice for a national system. And now we're at the table with our partners in government to figure out how to implement this ambitious plan. Senior Mothercraft staff, along with sector partners, regularly meet with all three orders of government to provide expert advice on

how to ensure the investments will be utilized wisely, well and to the benefit of children, their families and the professionals who serve them.

There are a few others things that make us excited about tomorrow. CWELCC includes investments in the early learning workforce through free or subsidized post-secondary education. Mothercraft College of ECE is proud to be participating in this initiative, offering a new, online ECE Diploma program that started in January 2023 with another to be offered again in December.

We were able to leverage our expertise in early intervention to secure two exciting new grants this past year: one is focused on supporting children and mothers who were disproportionately affected by COVID; the other is evaluating the virtual delivery of a pre-existing program that assesses how young children are doing in twelve key health, well-being and developmental areas.

And finally, in 2022 Mothercraft was able to resume working toward the execution of its ambitious 10-year strategic plan. The key strategies of the plan are expansion, modernization and leadership (to learn more, visit our website) with the overarching goal of improving our service users' sense of belonging, well-being and quality of relationships. In service to these goals, perhaps the most exciting thing we did in 2022 was to develop and approve two critical action plans: one focused on Truth & Reconciliation and the other on Diversity, Equity & Inclusion. Developed by two advisory councils with the support of subject-matter experts, each action plan is fulsome in its scope and thoughtful in its approach. And as we begin to implement these important plans in 2023, along with all the other strategic activities happening both internally and externally across Mothercraft, we grow ever more excited about what tomorrow may bring.

Mothercraft receives funding to adapt **Check It Out** (an early identification/screening program) to examine the efficacy of virtual delivery of the model. The project is piloted across Toronto.

Mothercraft receives over \$2M from the Public Health Agency of Canada for two new projects: *Connections for Breaking the Cycle of Violence* (to be delivered in 15 communities across Canada) and, *Healing Through Relationships: Responding to Mothers and Young Children Disproportionately Affected by COVID-19* (to support maternal and child mental health in Toronto).




